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
I am Lebogang, a boy who lives in a village called Motshawane.

Every morning, my mother prepares food for us when we return home from school.




One day we were left at home hungry because my mother forgot to cook food for us.




Our neighbour saw us playing outside. She noticed we were hungry she called us.
