Cultural heritage data in library

"Culture is a set of distinctive spiritual, material, intellectual, and emotional features of a society or a social group" (UNESCO)

- Books and manuscripts
- Photographs
- Audiovisual materials
- Genealogy materials, stone inscriptions & other forms of human knowledge









Stories in GLAMs



GLAM institutions:

- Repositories for the human record and creativity
- Collections of various forms of human narrative
- Need appropriate ways to fully present, reconstruct, and disseminate those 'stories'
- Stories are important elements of cultural heritage¹

Genealogy data

Genealogy book: record of family names and members (traditionally males) since the Western Zhou Dynasty (Chinese: 西周; c. 1045 – 771 BC)

- A valuable source to understand family history: how families grow, immigrations, important events, celebrities in the family, etc.
- An evidence of social history: events recorded in family history are also events in that area at that time (wars, population policy, etc.)
- A material to educate later generations: instructions recorded on the genealogy book

Genealogy stories towards research:

- Family dynamics and social structures over time
- Patterns of migration and settlement




Fig2. Image of Family Yan's instruction

Bakhtin's theory of chronotope

Narrative time-space continuum in the context of cultural heritage resources

"Chronotope":

- relationship between time and space in literature
- a specific way of organizing time and space within the narrative
- shapes the way the characters interact with each other and with their environment
- reflects the cultural and historical context in which the work was created

Application:

- analyze the ways in which cultural practices and discourses are shaped by the temporal and spatial contexts in which they occur
- provides a framework for analyzing the complex relationships between time, space, and culture








- around 70,000 entries

- spanning more than 3,000 years













Fig3. Family tree design by Xiangfan which used SHL genealogy data



The Journal of Open Humanities Data

- Launched in 2015; open access and peer-reviewed
- Fastest growing data journal for humanities research
- 83 articles published so far
- Vision: be a key part of a thriving community of scholars sharing humanities data
- Two publication types
 Short data papers (1000 words): descriptions of datasets with high reuse potential
 Full-length research papers (3000-5000 words): discussion of methods, challenges, and limitations in the creation, collection, management of humanities data
- Editor-in-chief: Barbara McGillivray (King's College London)
