Horniman Museum and Library Publications series (1904-1977)

ABSTRACT

Horniman Museum and Library published a group of visitor guides and handbooks to accompany permanent galleries under the series title "Horniman Museum and Library Publications". This paper presents a bibliography for the series, which covered subjects in zoology and anthropology. The series included sixteen publications. Many had multiple editions. Authors were not identified explicitly, and attribution was assigned to the institution. This paper identifies authors and other notable contributors for each volume. The Horniman stopped assigning new publications to the series at the end of the 1930s; however, new guides and handbooks continued to be published in similar fashion. Some new publications asserted continuity, claiming to be later editions. Others did not. This paper identifies those additional publications. Both continuity and break reveal aspects of work within the museum environment. Indeed, the evolution of this series offers insight into relationships between curators, professionalisation, and exhibition culture at the Horniman Museum over the twentieth century.

TEXT

In the first half of the twentieth century, Horniman Museum and Library published the "Horniman Museum and Library Publications" series. Generally, these were specialised handbooks associated with the museum's permanent galleries in anthropology and natural history. Handbooks sometimes provided detailed information about objects displayed in exhibition cases. They also created larger narratives for subjects associated with the museum's galleries. Handbooks were marketed to ordinary museum visitors and sold as inexpensive keepsakes within a broad education remit.

This paper untangles the bibliographic history of the Horniman Museum and Library Publications series. Online catalogues show considerable inconsistency regarding items in this series, confused by authorship, the appearance of multiple editions, and the use of different publishers over the decades of its production. The bibliography presented here assembles the series into a single sequence, through number 16 (evolution of animals). This bibliography also notes later publications not explicitly identified as part of the series but clearly fitting into its ethos and frequently identified informally as part of that series. Both continuity and break in identity seem to be important in the history of this series. Analysis of such patterns, however, is beyond the scope of this short note.

Authorship is a key area of bibliographical confusion. Authors were not identified on title pages, with attribution assigned only to the Horniman Museum and Library. Authors sometimes were noted in preface materials. Alternatively, they sometimes were noted retrospectively in later editions. Where known, authors are identified in the bibliography presented here; however, this list preserves the Horniman Museum and Library as volume author unless a named person appeared on the title page.

Some handbooks in the series can be used to reconstruct exhibit design. However, most do not offer case-to-case specificity. This was intentional. Curators designed thematic displays in the natural history gallery, and they wrote handbooks because they felt the need to relate objects in cases to more encompassing narratives, principles, or explanations. The 1912 handbook for new exhibits on

locomotion in animals, for instance, offered a way to "present a more connected account of the subject than can be given on the labels in the cases" (p. [ii]) Handbooks for anthropological subjects, especially those written by Herbert Spencer Harrison (e.g., numbers 7 and 8) interpreted objects through the advocacy lens of social Darwinism and Tylorist progressionism (Scott 2007).

Items in the Horniman Museum and Library Publications series were neither the first nor only publications produced by the institution. This series began after an institutional reorganisation that saw the museum and library rebuilt in 1900 then ownership transferred in 1901 from its founder to London County Council (LCC). Associated with this transfer was an expansion in facility and capability. Educational goals were amplified, too, Publications after 1901 were produced for the Horniman Museum and Library by LCC through the LCC's general publishing and procurement systems. Horniman publications normally included LCC catalogue numbers, printed on front covers. Horniman publications under the LCC were distributed by LCC agents as well as by the museum.

Development of the handbook series paralleled growth in permanent exhibitions at the Horniman Museum and Library. It also reflected increased specialisation amongst museum staff and in the communities the museum sought to engage. For instance, handbook number 2 (Study of Animal Life) grew into number 11 (locomotion in animals) and number 12 (survey of the animal kingdom). Reorganisation of the natural history gallery in the early 1920s led to new editions of number 11 (locomotion, second edition in 1923) and number 12 (survey, second edition in 1922) as well as expanded coverage of headline subjects in numbers 13 (human evolution), 15 (defences of animals), and 16 (evolution of animals).

Creation of new handbooks and revisions for existing handbooks stalled after 1929, after publication of the second edition of number 8 (War and the Chase). Only two new publications appeared in the 1930s. One was a third edition of From Stone to Steel (1936), published just before the exhibit's creator (Harrison) retired in 1937. Also, the general guide for the museum (number 1) was revised for a third edition in 1936.

The production of handbooks continued after the 1939-1945 war, with a revision in general design in the 1950s and a second redesign in the 1960s. However, handbooks after 1945 were no longer carried association with the pre-war "Horniman Museum and Library Publications" series. Formally, number 16 (evolution of animals) was the last publication designated in that series. Nevertheless, new museum publications continued literary and design patterns of earlier handbooks. Musical Instruments (1958) and Tropical Aquaria (1960) were examples. Survey of the Animal Kingdom (1959) was identified as a "third edition," though it was not numbered specifically as previously part of the series (number 12). Similarly, Defences of Animals (1972) was identified as a "second edition". No publication associated with this group of publications appeared after 1977.

Not all publications associated with Horniman exhibitions were associated with the notion of a handbook. The key criterion for inclusion appears to have been whether the material was part of the permanent displays. Examples of catalogues associated with temporary exhibitions at the Museum included Thero (1948), Jenkins and Olsen (1976), Doubleday (1998), and Horniman Museum (1975, 1979, 1981).

In 1993, the museum launched a new series, "Horniman World Heritage Series". Tobert (1993) was the first in the series. Other titles included Teague (1993) and Tobert (1994). In 1990, the museum and library were devolved from association with local government. They began operating as a charity, the Horniman Public Museum and Public Park Trust (registered charity 802725).

BIBLIOGRAPHY

The ordering of this bibliography is by handbook number as printed on the volume's cover. New editions are identified here with subordinate numerals, e.g., "1.2" is the second edition of handbook number 1. This notation is a convention used by the present paper and not used in the original series.

Later editions are not identified as part of the handbook series.

The nominal publication date for the second edition was 16 March 1909. In the library of the Horniman Museum, the copy of record has a handwritten note on its title page stating the second edition was "cancelled" dated 18 April 1909. No explanation is given.

No publication date is given. It likely is late 1904. In preface materials to handbook number 6.2, Mr Frank Slade (FZS), "the naturalist of the Museum," is identified as the author of this volume.

In 1912, the Horniman Museum published a Supplement to its library holdings as number 6a in the series. This appeared as a standalone publication. Also in 1912, the Museum reprinted its 1905 Handbook to the Library bound together the Supplement. This was identified as publication number "6,6a". The presumption might have been that those owning number 6 might purchase number 6a only, while those without number 6 could purchase both as a single issue of number 6,6a combined. This entailed reprinting number 6 in 1912 to be included as part of "6,6a".

In preface materials to handbook number 6.2. Mr. A. W. Pepper, the Librarian, is identified as the author of number 6. He also is the likely author of number 6a.

[Edmund] Rich is identified on the title page as "Education Officer", and he is sometimes taken to be the author. There is no supporting evidence for that assertion.

The publications listed below were not identified formally as part of the Horniman Museum and Library Publications series. However, they continue the pattern of handbooks in that series. Several are identified as later editions of handbooks, including numbers 12 (survey of animals) and 15 (defences of animals). They also show design and production continuities that link the volumes together in series. The catalogues associated with the Carse collection appear to represent a transition in design and direction, changed later in the decade.

Jean L. Jenkins is identified in preface materials as author. The addendum is "List of Books: Supplement," pp. 101-105. This addendum is described by David M. Boston in a Foreword, noting the remaining text was unchanged from the 1970 edition. Boston notes several recent "outstanding acquisitions" and two "major special exhibitions" mounted at the museum in 1973 and 1975.
