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
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We celebrate a traditional festival in the village as the Tswana people.



Keneilwe is a girl staying with her grandmother. Her grandmother taught her about the Tswana culture.



Keneilwe's grandmother taught her about the food that Tswana people eat, such as stiff porridge and vegetables.



"Tswana people have their own clothes. They wear their clothes when they celebrate Heritage Day," Keneilwe said.



Keneilwe thinks she needs to celebrate her culture and call people so they can come and celebrate with her. She wants to restore the love and spirit of supporting one's culture.




"The problem in this village is that people don't have the love and spirit of celebrating Heritage Day," said Omphile.
