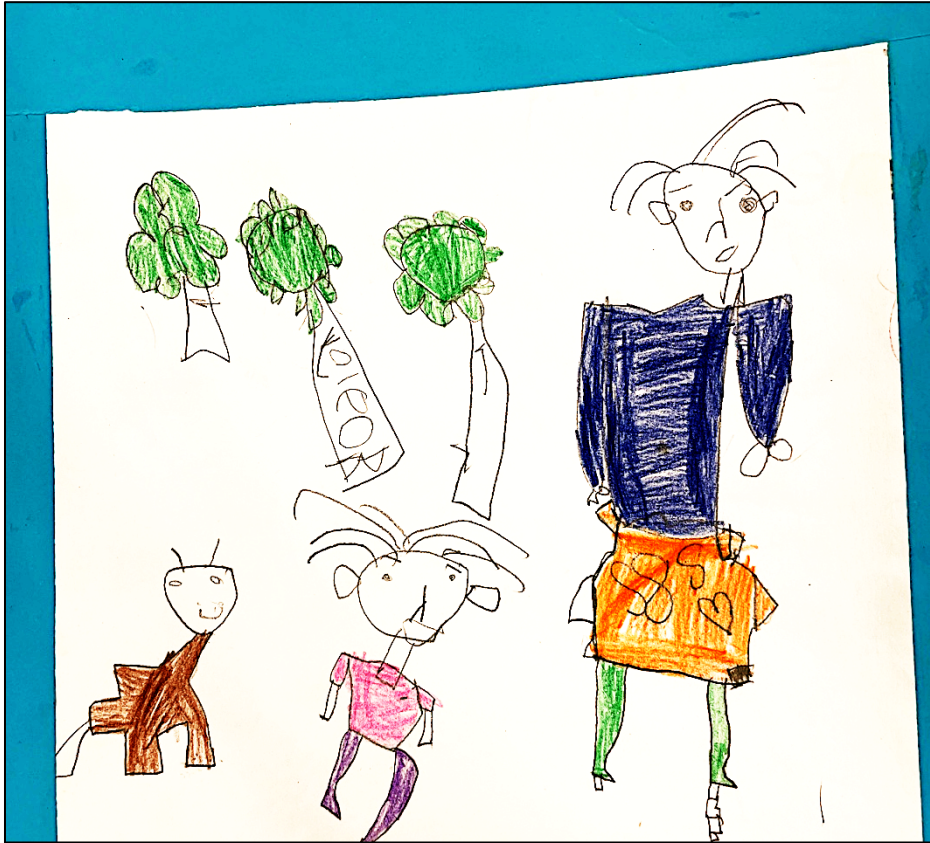

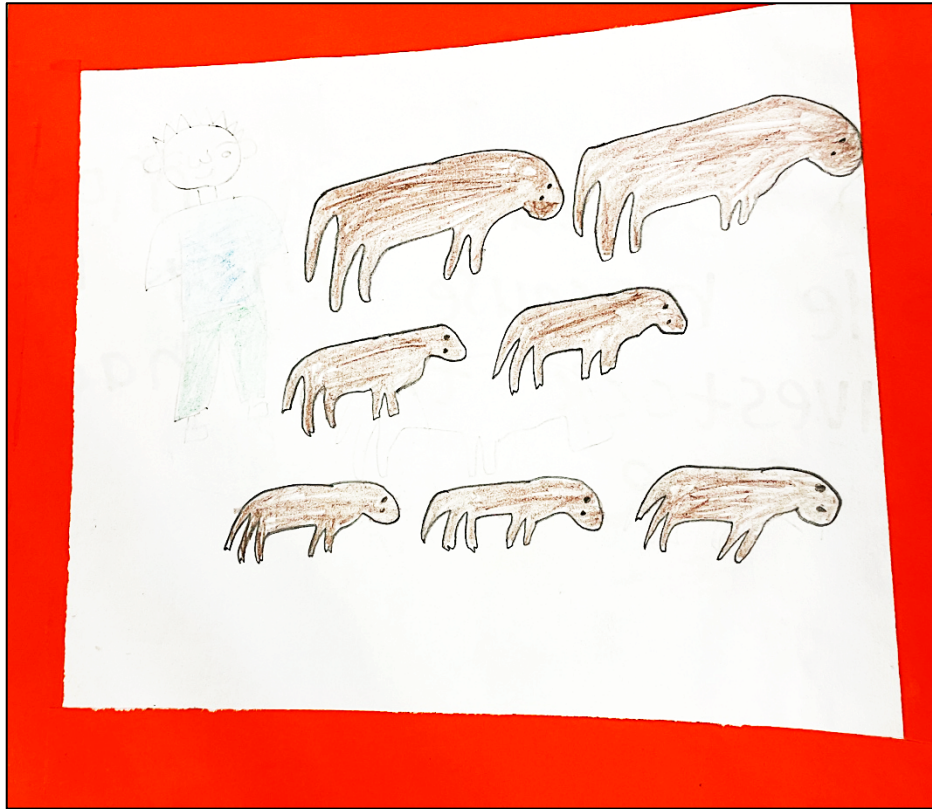
Modisaotsile was born to a family of childless parents.
