

Diamond Open Access

- Definition: Not charging money for authors to read or authors to submit manuscripts
- Diamond OA in numbers:
 - 17K-29K currently in existence (likely an undercount) and 2/3 of journals in DOAJ
 - 8-9% of global scholarly output (APC-OA journals are at 10-11%)
 - Comprise 44% of all articles in fully OA journals
- Relatively small journals, concentrated in the humanities and social sciences, serving diverse scholarly niches

Motivations for Diamond OA

- Ethical: It's the right thing to do
- Activist: Rejecting big publishing
- Novice: Low-threshold starting point; might want to get more formal later
- Labour of love: Crafting the perfect journal and/or filling a disciplinary niche

Usually it's a combination of factors

Benefits of Diamond OA

'Equitable, community driven, and academicled and -owned.'

- Accessibility of research
- Editorial control
- Nimble operations
- Ability to innovate

Satisfaction of making research accessible and available

Drawbacks of Diamond OA

- Few supporting resources
- Labour intensive
- Infrastructure limited
- Difficult to scale and sustain

Journal of Information Literacy



The journal

- Founded in 2008; publish 2-3 issues per year (8-12 articles per issue); peer reviewed
- Focus on information literacy (IL)
- Envisioned as a researcher-practitioner journal and a way of disseminating best practices
- Affiliated with the Information Literacy Group (ILG) of the Chartered Institute of Library and Information Professionals (CILIP)
- Part of IL maturing as a discipline
- Good rankings, especially with regard to our competitors, and key journal in our field

JIL and Diamond OA

- Diamond from the beginning (explicitly referencing the Budapest Open Access Initiative)
- Use of CC BY-SA licences
- Ethical standpoint
- Financial position
- Social aspects of librarianship







JIL operationally

- Hosted on OJS by Loughborough University since 2008
- Moving to Edinburgh Diamond in late 2022
- Editorial Board, Editor in Chief, Managing Editor, Production Editor, Book Review Editor, Statistician/Bibliometrician, Digital Comms Officer and several copy editors
- None of our positions are paid
- We do it all: Peer review management; metadata; ISBN registry; DOI assignment; copy editing; type setting; analytics; promotion and social media
- Most money has come via database royalties, though starting in 2022 we'll receive funds through CILIP

Benefits of Diamond

- Flexibility to chart our editorial direction, particularly through special issues
- Ability to innovate:
 - Anti-racist policies; inclusive language, removal of ableist language, mentoring scheme
 - Open peer review and explicit recognition of our copy editors and peer reviewers
- We have a long way to go to meet our aspirations, but we couldn't get there without the Diamond model



Drawbacks of Diamond

- Hidden labour huge amount of volunteer time. Requires commitment and the sustained/collective effort of many people
- Struggle to be seen as a 'real' journal in the eyes of big indexers (e.g., Clarivate/Web of Science)
- The precariousness of archiving



- 'Diamond' as a critical lens






 Sponsorship, donations, crowd funding, advertising, freemium, consortia, state funds, etc.
